

Mesoamerican Ballplayers

The people of Mesoamerica played an early team sport, the ballgame. They played on a court that was shaped like a capital letter I. The long central alley is where the teams played the game. The goal of the game might have been to get the ball past the other team, or to hit stone carvings that were placed along the side of the alley. Players were not allowed to use their hands.



The ballgame was dangerous! The ball was heavy and could break bones. Players had to wear special gear for protection.

Can you think of games we play today that require special protective gear?
